## *From Your Pastor*

Dear friends in Christ,

### **Commissioned for Mission**

Christmas is a time for stories in many families. When I was a child, we would decorate shoe boxes on Christmas Eve. On Christmas day, the shoe box would be filled with small boxes of cereal, Tang, walnuts, coins wrapped in foil, and a small cream pie. My brothers and I still talk about those boxes as part of our Christmas story.

The Christmas story of God is similar. God used a very common and simple vessel in which to place his only Son. The Prophet Isaiah wrote,

**Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel.**  
(Isaiah 7:14)

Through the simple and plain vessel of a woman, God has given us a great gift, the gift of his Son. His name was to be called "Immanuel," which means God with us. God has determined that the way to save people is to be "with them." We call this the incarnation- God "in the flesh."

We have a story to tell as a church, too. We are called as a congregation to be a **missional church**. God has sent us "in the flesh" to go out into the world with the story of Jesus. We don't need to share deep theological insights with people. We can simply share the story that has changed the final destiny of man forever.

Mission isn't intended to be hard. God has set the plan. He has shown us the importance of community, the importance of awareness, the importance of giving as elements of being missional. Now he gives us a simple story, the story of Jesus who has come down to be with us.

How can you best use this gift this December? You can invite a neighbor, friend, or family member who is not active in church life to join you in a church worship service. Many people who do not regularly attend worship know that Christmas is a time to go to church. They will not be surprised when (not if!!) you invite them. But to truly make this an incarnational event, I would encourage you to even offer to pick them up and bring them to church, or at least to wait for them at the front door. Our building layout can be confusing to a visitor, and you can be an incarnational member by being with the visitor, by sitting with them, and by encouraging them, so that they may hear the story of Jesus Christ, born into our world that we might be forgiven and saved.

Enjoy your Christmas stories again this year. But remember the best story of all, the story of Immanuel, Jesus in the flesh as we focus on being a **missional church**

## The Principal Connection ...

### The Benefit of "Small"

“But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are from of old, from ancient times.” Micah 5:2

Having fewer students per school is one of only three inputs found to have a positive impact on educational achievement, according to a statistical analysis reported in the latest issue of the American Legislative Exchange Council's *Report Card on American Education*.

According to another article I read recently, small schools are safer than large comprehensive schools. In small schools, everyone knows each other. Students are less likely to feel like outsiders. There are dramatic reductions in the incidents of fighting, vandalism, theft, and substance abuse. The safer, caring environment created by small schools promotes academic and personal development of all students.

Research has shown that the academic achievement of students is no different for students in a small classroom than it is for students in a larger classroom. When you look at the success of our students at our high schools you begin to see the merits of our Trinity Lutheran School education. I invoke the names of Brittany Komaskinski, Gretchen Hensley, and Kate Gardiner as examples of outstanding Trinity students who excelled in high school after attending Trinity through 8<sup>th</sup> grade.

We believe that at Trinity, the smallness of our school enables us to maintain a "family" atmosphere, where students get opportunities to help one another learn. Many opportunities arise where older students get to assist with a younger child's learning. With experienced, caring teachers and supportive parents, we feel Trinity Lutheran School offers a superior education for its students in a very safe environment.

Our 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter Midterms will come home on Friday December 5. We will engage in a Geography Bee December 18 at 1:00 PM in the gym. **Biloxi Trip #3:** We are tentatively scheduled for either the week of **February 15<sup>th</sup> or the 22<sup>nd</sup>**. I have notified Camp Gospel in Pass Christian, Mississippi that we may have between ten (10) and fourteen (14) travelers. We already have five (5) confirmed and all of them were on the last trip. So far I have talked with eight other people who seem interested in a mission trip. **New Classes beginning November 30<sup>th</sup> –December 21<sup>st</sup>**

Christmas: The Real Story Room 103  
led by Jim Hensley

Explore the biblical story of Christmas. Separate biblical fact from cultural fiction or religious tradition not based on the Bible. 4 weeks.

Abiding in Christ Room 102  
led by Greg Forsythe

As we look forward to Jesus' coming, Jesus invites us to stay connected to Him in every way. Look at how we are connected to Christ and how we might stay connected to Him. 4 weeks.

Sounds of Advent: Prepare for the King Room 101  
led by Karol Ketcher

Explore the stories behind some of the best loved hymns of the church for Advent and Christmas. Dig into the depths of the theology behind the words. Sing an old favorite or two. 4 weeks.

1 on 2 Discipleship Bible study is entering its 3<sup>rd</sup> season... The concept is simple. One person, who is willing, meets weekly with 2 others, who are willing, to work through a faith-growing Bible study for a year (18 sessions). The 'one' commits to being prepared, open to sharing their personal faith journey openly and honestly, and nurturing the 'two' in discipleship of Jesus. The 'two' commit to being prepared for the lesson, open to growth as the Spirit brings that growth and commit to becoming the 'one' for two others in the following year. Here's another way to understand this:

- I. Year 1, person 1 met with persons 2 & 3.
- II. Year 2, person 1 met with persons 4 & 5 and with persons 6 & 7. Those groups have concluded. Person 2 is still meeting with persons 8 & 9, and person 3 is still meeting with persons 10 & 11. Both groups are expected to finish soon.
- III. **Now**, in year 3, person 1 has a commitment from persons 12 & 13. Person 3 will soon begin with persons 14 & 15, while finishing with 10 & 11. Persons 4, 5, 6 & 7 are seeking 2 people each to begin their Intimate Journey Bible studies.
- IV. Soon, persons 2, 8, 9, 10 & 11 will be seeking 2 people each.

The goal: To grow closer to Jesus Christ in our walk of faith. It is an amazing journey full of God's amazing love. Are you interested? See DCE Wendt.
