From Your Pastor

Dear friends in Christ,

When I was growing up, one of the shows that I liked to watch was "The Lone Ranger." A masked man, who served as a Texas Ranger, fought crime in the old west. He worked without the help of any other Texas Rangers, and consequently was known as the "Lone Ranger." It made for great television then, but isn't very practical when doing the work of our Lord in mission and outreach.

In the very beginning, God saw that being a lone ranger was not good.

The Lord God said, "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make a helper suitable for him." (Genesis 2:18)

Solomon understood the benefits of working as a team, especially in the marriage relationship.

Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their work: If one falls down, his friend can help him up. But pity the man who falls and has no one to help him up! (Ecclesiastes 4:9-10a)

Working as a team is much more effective than working alone. Jesus knew this when He sent out His disciples two by two. One of my pastor friends used to say, "While one is talking, the other can be thinking!" This is great advice.

It is also relevant in church planting. This month's principle is "The Team Leader Principle."

The church planting pastor is most effective as part of a team on which he serves as the visionary leader.

Whenever the Apostle Paul planted a church, he left behind elders and leaders to guide the ministry. Specific men were set apart for this important work that was not intended to be Lone Ranger work.

This is relevant for us in our beginning work at Cedar Lake. We do not yet have a church planter, but have begun some of the work. No one person can do it alone. I understand this and have been working with a Mission Outreach Task Force these past twenty plus months. There is also a prayer team that meets monthly to pray for this work. We are also including the work of mission in Cedar Lake in our weekly prayers, and my newsletter articles also continue to emphasize this. This ultimately means that you are now involved in this ministry, at least from an awareness level. Each member of Trinity has an important part in the work of this mission work. It may be through your prayers. It may be by asking questions we haven't considered. It may be offering words of encouragement. It may simply be listening carefully and rejoicing in the steps that are taken. We pray that there will someday be a mission planter, and when that happens the work can continue at a much greater pace. Until then and even after that time, we will work together in this great mission opportunity.

The Team Leader Principle is also relevant to something else that is happening at Trinity. We are now part of a "Family Friendly Partners' Network." We realize how important the family is in what we do. The ministry done in Day School, youth ministry, Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, confirmation, and other ministries is based upon the importance of the family relationship with God. When we pray the Lord' Prayer, we pray about family when we say, "Our Father..." When we confess the Apostles' Creed, we acknowledge the importance of family when we say, "I believe in God, the Father almighty..." Family is important.

Trinity is now part of a network of seven other congregations in the Indiana District (St. Peter's- North Judson, Messiah and Calvary- Indianapolis, Faith-Bloomington, Grace- Columbus, Zion- Seymour, and Our Savior- Louisville) to work to better understand and appreciate family in our congregations. Dr. Ben Freudenberg, a professor at Concordia, Ann Arbor, is one of the leading synod teachers in family relationship. Dr. Freudenberg has begun work with the eight partners to help us be more focused on the God-given gift of family in our congregations. We will not work as Lone Rangers, but will share ideas with these other congregations and they will share with us. This is a great chance for us to partner in this work. As time passes, we will begin to make ministry adjustments to enhance and support the family in faith formation and in relationships within the family.

As we consider God's call to mission both within and outside the congregation, may we be continually be reminded that "The Lone Ranger" was a role reserved for Christ when He gave His life for us. He alone could pay the price for our broken family situations and He did it. Now he places us in relationships that we may help each other up and rejoice in working together. Remember, The Lone Ranger is only a television show and not a means or method for ministry!

Churches Planting Churches

Don't forget to register for the Churches Planting Churches workshop on October 14-15. The Mission Outreach Task Force has a goal of registering at least 30 Trinity members for the Friday session. The workshop is being funded by Mission Planting Advocates of Indiana. This conference is open to churches throughout the United States. We have made special invitations to the area Lutheran pastors.

The presenter is Rev. Mike Ruhl, a former LCMS Michigan District mission facilitator, church planter, and now director of Center For U.S. Missions (C4USM). Paul Wendt, Kathy O'Day, and Pastor Easterday have been to two different workshops with Rev. Ruhl, and he conveys Biblical and passionate teaching about church planting. On Friday, October 14, the topics will include: Biblical Principles of Church Planting, Why Churches Plant Churches, Objections To Church Planting, What God Could Do Through You, Capturing The Mother Church Pastor's Heart, How to Know When It Is Time To Plant, Parenting Mistakes To Avoid, Introduction To The Six Step Process, Sharing The Dream, Thinking Through A Possible Vision For Church Planting, Finding a Church Planter And Launch Team, and Calculating Our Possible Involvement In Church Planting.

Final registration is Wednesday, October 12. We are asking for a \$10 donation to cover the cost of the book. We are providing lunch as well as morning and afternoon snacks for this event. Registration forms are in the green sheets in the bulletin or can be secured by contacting the church office. If you have any questions, please talk with Paul Wendt, Kathy O'Day, or Pastor Easterday. This will be a very worthwhile workshop as we look to the work of proclaiming the message of Jesus Christ to area communities!

The Principal Connection ...

"Both Great and Small Praise our God!"

"Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that He may lift you up in due time. Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you." 1 Peter 5: 6-7

Humility is the ability to see ourselves as God describes us. During the 1970's Muhammad Ali reigned as the heavyweight boxing champ. After boarding an airplane one day, however, Ali met his match.

From the Executive Director ...

Last month, I highlighted several areas where Trinity's ministry is growing, such as increased upper grade enrollment in our Day School, start-up of a new 11:00 a.m. Contemporary Worship service, continued work toward a church plant in Cedar Lake, and having a fully functioning Stephen Ministry program. We thank the Lord for guiding Trinity in these directions and we thank you for supporting all of Trinity's ministries with your ideas, prayers, and gifts.

This month, I'd like to update you on our progress and needs on the financial front. At our recent June congregation meeting, we reviewed the financial impact of the unexpected drop in school enrollment for the 2010-2011 school year and the many expense-cutting and income-boosting actions we had taken in response to that surprise. We subsequently finished the fiscal year on June 30 with a deficit of about \$65,000 (\$1,682,000 income less \$1,747,000 expenses) – obligations we carry over to this year.

After much discussion of Trinity's priorities and options, the congregation agreed to NOT cut ministry or staff for the July 2011 – June 2012 fiscal year. We wanted to give ourselves another year to work on increasing Day School enrollment, to see the impact of our new Development Director, to grow the congregation through our Outreach efforts, and to hopefully see an economic recovery that lightens everyone's financial burdens. With some reluctance, the congregation passed a budget for the July 2011 – June 2012 fiscal year that requires Trinity's total income to increase by about 14% to avoid running another deficit and authorizes us to tap a bank line of credit if cash flow runs short.

So how are things looking so far this fiscal year? The good news is that Day School enrollment has stabilized at about last year's total and the resulting tuition and fee income is at budgeted levels. Offering income is now in a nice uptrend – up about 6% over last year's pace. However, since we now expect no overall growth in school income, the 14% income increase needed to avoid going into debt must come entirely from increased offerings. Through September 16, offerings are up, but are about \$1500 per week short of meeting our expenses. Though that might sound like a lot, that's only \$2.31 per person that attends worship services each weekend at Trinity (\$1500 / 650 avg. attendance)

Once again, we ask you to prayerfully consider whether you might be able to increase your regular weekly offerings to plug the gap. It doesn't take much from each individual to have a huge collective impact. For example, if every adult household was able to give \$20 more per month, our deficit would be long gone. We know that times are tough, so this may not be possible for some. But for many, this is very doable, and some may be able to do much more. The choice is yours, as 2 Corinthians 9:7 reminds us: *"Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."*

As always, your participation and prayers are needed to help Trinity fulfill its purpose in God's plans.

You Don't Have to Do "it" Alone! That's a relief, isn't it? What is the "it" in your life? Maybe you're a caregiver and all of your energy and time is going into the care of someone else; maybe a new diagnosis terrifies you but you are compelled to stay strong for those who love you most; perhaps those around you are challenging the way you think about your place in Christ's family. Whatever you're going through, whatever cards you've been dealt, you don't have to do it alone. Women will receive a female caregiver and men will receive a male caregiver. Child Protection Training

All volunteers and staff working with children (anyone under 18) must be Child Protection Policy certified.

Adults

Certification for those over 18 includes: 1) filling out a Volunteer Application, 2) permitting a Limited Criminal History background check, and 3) attending a 45 min. to 1 hour training session. **[Note: sensitive issues concerning child abuse and its prevention are presented in this training session.]** Youth, age 16-17 may attend this training with parental permission. Not recommended for younger youth. Certification is normally good for 3 years.

Values, money and teens – what do they have in common?

Believe it or not, it's you! When it comes to money, what values do you want your child to have? Generosity? Responsibility? Thrift? Something else? Values serve as an important foundation to managing money.

Did you know:

- When a group of parents were asked to select a topic they wish they had learned more about when they were teens, 57% chose money management.* 67% of parents think their teens are not interested in learning about personal money management.**
- 60% of American teens identified personal finance as a top priority.**

Have a discussion with your teen about personal money management (share, save and spend) and how they can be good stewards of their resources. Talk about their values, their goals and share your experiences to help open up the discussion. Starting the conversation now can help develop healthy money habits that will last a lifetime.
