From Your Pastor

Dear friends in Christ,
God has given us a wonderful calling as His church. Last month I shared a theme for the year: **Commissioned for Mission**. This is not something to take lightly. God has given us a purpose. This purpose gives life and vitality to our ministry, as we consider the great power of God's word of Jesus Christ!

What does it mean to be a **missional church**? It means that we understand that being a missional church happens within a community. Since the beginning of time, God affirmed that we are to be with other people. Consider what God realized at creation.

The Lord God said, "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make a helper suitable for him." (Genesis 2:18)

God created that helper that we know as Eve, and since that time, man has been blessed to be in a community with others!

Jesus affirmed that the work of God's people centers on community when He identified the greatest commandments.

Jesus replied, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'"
(Matthew 22:37-39)

We live out our lives in a community. We are placed in community so that we may love others as Jesus loved us.

Consider the work of the disciples.

The apostles performed many miraculous signs and wonders among the people.
(Acts 5:12a)

The work of the church takes place among the people. It begins with the community known as worship. It continues in the community known as group Bible study. It is seen in small groups. It continues to be a moving ministry, going out into the community so that more may hear and know Jesus. It happens when we show compassion to a neighbor or friend, and help them to know that our love for them is a result of Christ's love for us. It happens when we band together to help the less fortunate. Ultimately, we are **commissioned for mission among the people**.

Perhaps now is a good time for each of us (even your Pastor) to reflect on what we are doing among the people. How many of our ministries are actually out in the community? I'm not sure I can even answer that question completely. Ministry among the people in the community takes great courage. It is easy to establish a core of friends in the church which is a wonderful blessing, and lose sight of the community. Perhaps that is why I consider ministries like Rebuilding the Breach (Bakery House) and Fair Booth ministry as an important part of what we do at Trinity. The 140th Anniversary celebration for the community is another way that we strive to be among the people!

I would challenge you to think about each of the ministries that you are working in, and to consider if there are some simple ways to be among the people as a missional church that loves and serves Jesus!

From the Music Director ...

Following the Master Teacher

...whoever wants to be great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be your slave—just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many. Matthew 20:26b-28

A large part of our sinful nature, with which we do battle all our lives and for which we depend on the Lord for deliverance, is a thirst for glory—a desire to satisfy our perceived needs. It often drives our decision making, our child-rearing, and our relationships with God and our neighbor. There are times in our lives when our thirst for glory becomes painfully clear to us and there are other times when we feel our decisions are service oriented yet in reality are subtly glory oriented. This is sadly true for all of us and, as disciples of the Master Teacher, we spend our lives praying the Holy Spirit to weed this need for glory out of us and grow in us the spirit of service.

Recently it's been my experience to hear comments on worship and areas of service in the church that go something like, "I'm not really interested—I need to do what's good for me." Or, "My child is pretty busy and I need to do what's best for her. We don't have time for that kind of thing." ("that kind of thing" referring to worship time or service to the Lord)

Of course we should make thoughtful decisions and do what's best—but the question is, best for whom or what really is the "best"? If Jesus did what was "best" for Him we would all be destined for damnation. And Jesus is our example—He is our teacher—the Master Teacher. Just as he put our needs first we must put the needs of others first, sometimes at a cost to us. Did putting our needs first cost Jesus anything?

Martin Luther said, "The thirst for glory is not ended by satisfying it but rather by extinguishing it." We battle against Satan, the world, and our own sinful flesh throughout our lives. We want to follow the Master Teacher, our Savior, in extinguishing the thirst for glory. He calls us to follow Him in exactly that way—to extinguish our own glory and to take on the servant's cross. What's best for us and for Christ's Church is that we become "theologians of the cross" not "theologians of glory".

Worship at Trinity has often been listed by us as one of the things we do well. But we're struggling right now to keep aspects of our worship strong. The adult choir, handbell and instrumental groups are in need of faithful servants who understand a "theology of the cross" and are willing to set aside personal needs. Our children's groups need supportive parents who will encourage service and understand that children who serve Christ are learning the ways of the Master Teacher and losing nothing.

At a conference I attended recently the president of one of our seminaries made the comment in a lecture that he was concerned that many of our churches are depressed. Let me boldly suggest that, if this is the case, and I also suspect that it might be, it's because we so often follow a "theology of glory" rather than a "theology of

the cross". There is great joy in serving Christ, following His teaching and example, and setting aside our own "needs". Let us be vigilant in prayer, study of Scripture, and in searching out the treasure of our hearts as we spend our lives in service as theologians of Christ's cross.

All for Christ I have forsaken and have taken up my cross; Worldly joy, its fame and fortune, now I count as worthless dross.

Who is sweeter than Christ Jesus? No good thing in Him I lack! Hand to plow, at peace I follow where He leads me. Why look back?

Gone the past, unknown the future—grace supplies my daily breath; Strong in Christ through death's dark valley, firm and faithful unto death.

When God takes me home to heaven, should this be the day I die, God will keep my spouse and children as the apple of His eye.

Though the road ahead be thorny, though dark clouds all light obscure, Though my cross-shaped path grows steeper, with the Lord, I am secure.

Our theme for this year was chosen by our 8th grade class last year in preparation for their final year. We have two children in 8th grade this year. I am so proud of them. If we were left to do this all on our own we would certainly fail. But God has a plan. His plan is for the ultimate salvation of our children. We want to help you as

parents as you bring your children up in the Lord. We are so thankful to the Lord for the opportunity to do this!

Thanks to all of you who were able to attend our Registration Day, this was a magnificent success! Thanks also to those who were able to make it to our PTL Back to School BBQ. We are so thankful for our PTL officers Ed Fraikin, Chris Dixon, Tammy Gardin, Kerri Wilkes, Marv Hecht, and our teacher representative Terry Chelap. We thank our Lord for all of this!

You are all welcome to attend our chapel services which are held every Wednesday at 2:00 p.m.. We are delighted that our faculty has remained the same as last year. Mrs. Laura Sauermaier will teach 8th, Mrs. Christine Miller will teach 7th, Mr. Arron Lehman will teach 6th. Mrs. Diana Dyba will be our Art teacher and assist Mrs. Ketcher with teaching on Wednesdays when Mrs. Ketcher is conducting our Music program. Mrs. Mary Nemeth will be teaching 5th grade until she has her baby who is expected to arrive in January.

Mrs. Kathy Ickstadt will again teach 4th, Mrs. Ruth Schultz will teach 3rd, Mrs. Karol Ketcher will teach 2nd, Mrs. Ginny Masengarb will teach 1st and she will be assisted by Mrs. Bonnie Weglewski as her teacher's aide.
